Rector's Letter

he Book of Common Prayer instructs us to repeat the Collect for Advent Sunday every day of the Advent season in our common worship and personal devotion. If you are unable to find time to add anything else to your spiritual practise during Advent, I would recommend doing at least this. Either first thing in the morning, or while riding the TTC to work, or before going to bed, simply read, and meditate upon, and pray this collect every day from December 2 until December 23.

The Collect identifies three specific moments in time:

- 1. the moment Jesus "came to visit us in great humility" (his birth);
- 2. the moment he will "come again ... to judge both the quick and the dead" (his

second coming);

3. the "time of this mortal life" (the moment in which we now live).

You see, our lives, as Christians, exist inbetween two great bookends – the coming of Jesus as a baby and the coming of Jesus at the end of time. Everything that happens in the story of our lives is coloured and shaped by these two events.

We can endure all things, even the hardest and most painful, because Christ, in human flesh, endured worse before us, and because Christ will one day make all things right. We live, as the collect says, wearing an "armour of light," because we live in the season of Christ's light on earth; we live between his coming and his coming again.

May all of us, each day, put upon ourselves this heavenly armour, that we may "cast away the works of darkness" forever. Rob+
