Bishop's Lenten series draws crowd weekly

or the past five Wednesdays St. Olave's has been host to Bishop . Jenny Andison and a Lenten series called Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John. The resource was written by the Brothers of the Society of St. John the Evangelist in Boston. The series has been extremely successful, both in terms of attendance (holding fast at 70 folks each week) as well as fellowship and spiritual learning.

"I'm surprised the attendance has been so stable," says Bishop Jenny. "My sense is that it's meeting a need. This is our bread and butter, there are no gimmicks. People want to read the Bible together, eat together and pray together. We are experiencing the simple joy in Christian fellowship."

This is also part of the teaching office of the Bishop, Bishop Jenny adds. "I find it very fulfilling to teach the faith." By 6:30 p.m., participants have arrived from the deaneries of Parkdale West Toronto and Etobicoke-Humber, with more than eight parishes represented. Several

clergy have also been present. Supper is prepared by Addus (our weekday users) and faithfully served at 6:30 p.m. by members of our ACW and other volunteers.

"Hospitality must be a spiritual gift of St. Olave's parish," said Bishop Jenny.

By 7 p.m., more people roll in, with their Meeting Jesus prayer journals clutched in one hand and a Bible in the other. Bishop Jenny introduces the topic for the week with an engaging talk. Then she takes us through the assigned scriptural verses, reading the reflections of the Brothers of St. John the Evangelist in Boston. Thousands

of people across North America are doing or individually online.

The talk is punctuated with one-on-one discussion points with your neighbour, as well as moments of prayer and reflection. "I remember that first week when I asked you to pray quietly for five minutes, there was quite a bit of trepidation," said Bishop Jenny during week four, noting participants were becoming much more comfortable with the idea.

"I am extremely grateful to the ACW for convening the food service, William Cowling for organizing the catering, as well as many other volunteers who jumped in to help serve, clean up and host," says Rev'd Rob. "It has been a wonderful way to come together and make connections with other churches and showcase St. Olave's."

Maundy Thursday awash in symbolism

Rector's Letter The Rev'd Robert Mitchell

he term "Maundy Thursday" is derived from the Latin (mandatum novum) of John 13.34: "A new Commandment" Those words were spoken by Jesus immediately after he washed the disciples' feet on the night before his Passion. During supper he got up, took off his outer garment, tied a towel around his waist, and began to wash each of the disciples' feet.

We have grown accustomed to this story and it fails to shock us, but we must remind ourselves how shocking this act was for the disciples. Jesus, their beloved teacher and leader, was stooping down in the form of a slave. It was the ultimate act of humility and self-giving. And it was, in fact, a symbol of Jesus' entire earthly ministry. As one who was of God, he "emptied himself" and took the "form of a slave," being born in human likeness, and became obedient to the point of death on a cross. (Philippians 2.6-8) After finishing this shocking display of self-disregard, he told the disciples, "A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another, as I have loved you." We are, as Christians, called to show this same humility and love for others as he showed us in his incarnation, suffering and death.

The Thursday before Easter has been named after the mandatum novum because it is traditionally the day that the ceremony of the washing of feet was enacted in the churches. For the first time ever at St. Olave's, we will be incorporating this simple and beautiful ceremony into our Maundy Thursday service. I encourage you to come and see this symbolic ritual as part of your journey toward Easter. May God bless you and your family at this most sacred time of year.

SECOND CENTURY FUND UPDATE

Supporting children in Burkina Faso

T. Olave's Second Century Mission Fund sponsors four children through Christian Children's Fund of Canada. They live in Burkina Faso in West Africa, one of the most disadvantaged countries in the world.

CCFC has been working in Burkina Faso since 1987. It works in partnership with local organizations to help improve life for children, their families and their communities in five key areas: health and nutrition; education; water, sanitation and hygiene; sustainable economic growth; and strengthening community organizations.

Forced child marriages (FCM) are a recurring problem in many developing countries, and Burkina Faso is no exception. FCM is a serious violation of young girls' human rights. It perpetuates existing gender inequalities, and it has been an obstacle to girls' development and survival.

Through the intervention of community volunteers, over 4,000 people have received home based visits, and four cases of girls being abducted have been avoided, through dialogue and awareness-raising (the girls have returned home after involvement and negotiation of a community volunteer). By involving local authorities and government institutions from the start of the project, CCFC has been able to increase access to protective services for community members threatened with FCM.

Two communities CCFC is supporting in Burkina Faso are also employing Learning Through Play (LTP) early childhood development programs. LTP engages parents in play activities with their own children in order to foster healthy child development and promote attachment, which helps children thrive. UNICEF is participating with CCFC in this effort.

Spring forward at St. Olave's

oin us throughout spring as our biggest ever season of special events continues with more music, entertainment, feature talks and engaging discussions.

We begin our season on **Wednesday April 11** with Rev'd Dr. Schuyler Brown's four-part weekly discussion series for Eastertide on the *Language* of the King James Bible, in which he examines key writings that explore the emotional power of the KJV's poetry and heightened language (as also found in the Prayer Book). He focuses on Adam Nicolson's book *God's Secretaries*, plus works by Paul Kugler and Sarah Thomson. Evening Prayer at 6 each week is followed by a light supper at 6:30, with the discussion at 7 and a session of informal Q&As at about 8.

We mark St. George's Eve on **Sunday April 22** with Choral Evensong at 4 followed by the annual St. George's Tea. We then change the focus at 5 to the Best of Canadiana, in which St. Olave's Arts Guild and their guests present music by Joni Mitchell and Neil Young; prose by Lucy Maud Montgomery; poetry by Pickthall and Kogawa; and an exploration of Toronto's history – as we continue our year-long celebration of Canada 150.

Our Ascension Day event on **Thursday May 10** opens at 6 p.m. with Holy Communion, followed by a light supper. Then shortly after 7, we continue with Rev'd Canon David Brinton's Feature Talk on Faith and Fiction, plus your Q&As. He will discuss theological themes in contemporary fiction by many famous and lesser-known authors, including Muriel Spark, Flannery O'Connor and Marilynne Robinson. As with P.D. James, he's noted for a life-long love of the Book of Common Prayer. Canon David retired last year as Vicar and Sub-Dean, after 17 years at St. James Cathedral in Toronto. He is currently the Interim Priest-in-Charge at St. Thomas's while Fr Mark Andrews is on sabbatical.

On **Sunday June 3** at 4, we mark the day after the 65th anniversary of the Queen's Coronation with a very special Coronation Evensong and our Royal Festive Strawberry Tea. Then at 5, guitarist Doug Hibovski returns to St. Olave's to present Crowns and Coronets, a 45-minute cross-over sequence of glorious music with Royal connections, from the time of Elizabeth I and John Dowland to the popular and classical music of our present Queen's reign.


