Wardens' Report

The key duties of a Warden are to support the ministries of the parish and oversee the financial operations of the church. Our core ministry is to offer quality worship experiences that will inspire and restore all who come here; to help us know and love Jesus, wherever we may be on our faith journey. We are truly blessed to have Canon Rob who leads our services and preaches with creativity, care and competence.

Our growing church

We have welcomed many new families to St. Olave's this past year and each week continue to draw visitors. A high point in our attendance was Easter Day (115). The last time we had that many people at Easter was 2018 with 125 in attendance. We are also seeing long time parishioners coming to church more often. Christmas Eve also surpassed 2023 numbers at 111. Our stewardship committee set an attendance goal for 2024, and you can read more about that in Martha Drake's report.

Online Attendance

In 2023, the Diocese of Toronto began recording online attendance and found, when including those numbers, a significant uptick in attendance. On its own, that might not be remarkable, but donations have increased as well. The slide below shows the 13 parishes with the highest percentage of online worship. St. Olave's online attendance accounted for 55.25% of its total Average Sunday Attendance, the 8th highest. Together these 13 parishes account for 50% of online worship in the diocese.

- Christmas concert benefitting Bloor West Food Bank


Canon Rob, as Regional Dean, also spearheaded the first ever Deanery Evensong, and many parishioners attended the service at St. Thomas's, Huron Street.

Our financial health

Now, the other part of warden duties: business. We are indebted to our treasurer Annis Tebbutt, who continues to do the weekly collection count and track offerings (among other things), and Judy for doing the banking and maintaining the ledger.

The pie charts below break down our income and expenses. Please note, the pie chart does not include the \$20,962 received in 2024 to replace windows in the parish hall.

We finished the year with an operational deficit of approximately -\$11,000 and a drawdown of the capital fund that was \$23,000 higher than forecast.



Operating Income

There are a few reasons for this deficit:

- On the income side, the givings target was under by \$11,000 and our rental income was under by \$10,000 (tenants and parking).
- On the expense side, we ran about \$10,000 over budget, due to unexpected legal fees for conclusion of the Romanian mission contract and HST on the Rectory bathroom (for which the 70% rebate will come in 2025). Carpet cleaning and a new refrigerator led to a slight increase over budget in building expenses.

Other income

Our rentals (including parking tenants) accounted for 17% of our income in 2024 and the wardens spend a lot of time and energy on supporting and strengthening these partnerships. Appropriate permissions and insurance are required, usage must be coordinated. The building must be kept clean and safe for everyone's enjoyment. Most of these rentals are to tenants with lease agreements, but some are also one-off usage.

There are currently 12 parking tenants from local businesses. We enjoy strong partnerships with several groups:

This year we lost the 155th Guiding Unit, due to irreconcilable differences between the Diocese of Toronto and Girl Guides of Canada.

Property projects

We managed to move several projects forward in 2024:

- The chairlift was repaired, thanks to the dogged determination of our property chair Sheila Tait, ODT, and a donation from our ACW to support the repair costs.
- Our electronic sign was installed on the front lawn, within the existing sign. This is a key way to invite the community in.
- In-ground sprinklers were installed with a designated donation made in 2023.
- Our accessibility proposal was approved by the Diocese of Toronto after a successful presentation.

• We hired Romario Maharaj as our new sexton!

Saying goodbye

In June, we concluded our relationship with Kathy Langston and the Mission to Romania. There is no doubt that Kathy's support of orphans after the fall of that country in the '90s was incredibly impactful. She worked tirelessly and built a life-changing program. However, after discussions at Advisory Board, the wardens felt it was time to move on. We worked with a leading charity law firm to ensure the relationship finished on a positive note. Kathy was able to find another reputable Christian charity to receive donations and issue tax receipts. The remaining donations in the Romanian account were transferred at Kathy's request.

We thank God for the service of Sue Harris and Bob Ragsdale, ODT, both former Wardens who died in the past 12 months. May their legacy as role models for lay leadership continue for years to come.

And the final goodbye is to Carol Ambler, our Deputy People's Warden since 2021. Carol has led the Youth Group for almost 20 years with kindness and patience (on Zoom with the kids **every Friday night** during the pandemic), led countless outings to escape rooms, treetop trekking, D&D sessions, Casa Loma, movie and craft nights and probably has gone through dozens of Pizza Pizza reward cards over the years. As a Warden, Carol stepped up to organize our greeter team and learned how to operate the live stream. She was a valuable member of the Stewardship Committee and the Accessibility Committee. And her participation in organizing the Christmas Craft Show for the last several years has been ever stalwart. On our team, Carol's calm energy made her an ideal Advisory Board chair and a wise contributor. Carol has moved to London to be able to support her parents. She will be so missed, and hopefully an occasional visitor. We know she'll be watching online!

We are grateful for Henry Jeens' willingness to let his name stand for Deputy People's Warden. As the co-chair of the Accessibility Committee, a member of the Servers' Guild and a parent in the Junior Church, he will bring a valuable voice and perspective to the team.
